In 1925 American Legion members, Auxiliary & American citizens joined the campaign to take care of World War I veterans, widows and children who struggled to return to regular life. Raising nearly \$5 million and established The American Legion Endowment Fund. Out of this the TFA was founded and the endowment fund continues to help veterans by funding training for service officers, so that they are up to date on the latest veteran claim regulations, procedures and laws within the Department of Veterans Affairs and the United States Court of Appeals.

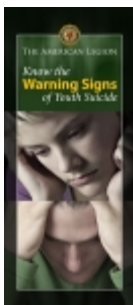
It is highly recommended that they travel in groups to guarantee their SAFETY.

Know the Warning Signs of Youth Suicide

Recently I was looking over various Children & Youth programs of the American Legion and I noticed that the American Legion is concerned about the welfare of our nation's youth, and the warning signs of suicide that may threaten them.

Suicide!! I believe I have only heard of three (3) teen suicides in my lifetime, one of which was a friend of my youngest son.

However, information shows that among young people ages 15 to 24, this problem continues to be the third leading cause of death and the fourth leading cause of death for 10 to 14 year olds.

Evidence shows that over **4,600** young Americans take their own lives annually, and according to the **Jason Foundation**, more teenagers and young adults die each year of **suicide** than from cancer, heart disease and birth combined.

Suicide is often a “cry for help” that ends in tragedy. Some people who are contemplating suicide go back and forth, considering life and death, and most exhibit warning signs prior to a suicide attempt.

Wouldn't it be nice if we could familiarize ourselves with those warning signs, such as **abrupt changes in eating habits, decline in schoolwork, or mood swings and personality changes?**

It may be as simple as listening carefully to someone who may need a chance to express his or her feelings, and letting them know that you are concerned and want to help, perhaps you could call the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline 1-800-273-TALK (273-8255).

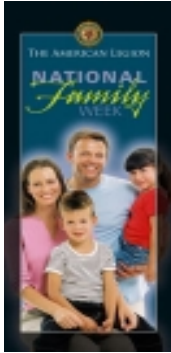
